North East LHIN Invests in Aging At Home Programs

McGuinty Government Helping More Seniors Get Health Care At Home

NEWS August 31, 2010

The Government of Ontario is continuing to invest in the successful Aging at Home strategy. Today's announcement brings the total amount provided to the North East Local Health Integration Network to \$16.8 million to ensure more seniors get health care at home or in the community.

As part of the successful Aging at Home strategy, the North East LHIN is using the funding for local programs that provide health services to seniors in the comfort and dignity of their own home which allows seniors to lead healthy and independent lives while avoiding unnecessary visits to hospitals. As a result, hospitals can ultimately improve Emergency Department wait times.

Initiatives under the Aging at Home strategy include new community-based services such as:

- A **Home First Strategy** that supports patients returning home after an acute event is over so that seniors receive care in the community instead of in a hospital.
- Enhanced assisted living services such as transportation services for seniors and Meals on Wheels to allow seniors to remain in the comfort of their own homes or supportive housing units.
- Assess and Restore Beds a made in Northeastern Ontario initiative for seniors as a
 partnership between the NE CCAC and selected area hospitals. It provides a place where
 people discharged from acute care treatment can stay for up to 90 days to receive care to help
 them recover strength and endurance so that they can then be discharged to their home or
 another appropriate setting in the community.

Investing in better local community supports will help improve Ontario's Alternate Level of Care (ALC) rate. ALC patients are individuals in hospital beds who would be better cared for in an alternate setting, such as long-term care, rehab, or home. By giving seniors the support they need to avoid hospitalization in the first place and helping those who do get admitted return home faster, access to health care will be improved for all Ontarians.

Backgrounder

North East LHIN Invests \$16.8 million in Northeastern Ontario Seniors Programs will help to reduce region's Emergency Room/Alternate Level of Care pressures

The NE LHIN is investing \$16.8 million over three years in Aging at Home strategies across Northeastern Ontario. Year 3 of the program includes \$6.1 million to further support caring for the frail and elderly within Northeastern Ontario.

Aging at Home initiatives within the NE LHIN are helping to reduce community ALC pressures and unnecessary emergency room visits by seniors through an increase in innovative solutions such as more: home care support programs, assisted living services, community-based services such as help with transportation, personal hygiene and meal preparation, geriatric nurses in emergency rooms, and social support for seniors.

Funding in year three will be used to address the following five program areas:

- 1. Transitional Beds/New Long-term Care Beds, Redevelopment of long-term care beds
- 2. Transitional Bed Capacity (i.e. interim long-term care beds and assess and restore beds)
- 3. Outreach teams (i.e. Assisted Living Services)
- 4. Aboriginal/First Nations/Métis Community Enhancement/Discharge Planning Programs
- 5. North East Regional Geriatric Services

What is an Alternate Level of Care (ALC) patient and how do ALC patients impact ER wait times?

ALC patients are people in hospital beds who would be better cared for in an alternate setting, such as long-term care, rehab, or home. Having more home care and community services enables ALC patients to leave hospital sooner, making more beds available to ER patients who are waiting to be admitted to hospital.

How does the Aging at Home strategy help reduce ER wait times?

Our ER wait times strategy committed to reducing the time that patients wait from the moment they arrive at the ER to when they leave.

A small number of patients, approximately ten per cent, are admitted to the hospital for further tests and procedures. In order to reduce their time waiting for a bed, we need to decrease the number of patients that are waiting for discharge home with supports or space in a long term care home. Our Aging at Home and ALC strategies help to ensure that patients can transition out of the hospital safely to make room for ER patients waiting to be admitted.
